
ASSESSMENTS

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2016 Horse Camp Workshops:

Equitation: Instruction will be given in western equitation and pattern execution. Seat and hand position will be stressed as well as leads and other techniques needed for completing assessments.

Horsemanship/Riding: Sessions will emphasize training both young and older horses to become your partner in whatever discipline of riding you are interested in.

Horseman Strength Training: Become a better equestrian athlete with stretches & strength training techniques specifically designed for horsemen.

Horse Evaluation: Learn what to look for when evaluating horses or buying a new horse. Develop your “eye” for horse selection and critique! Learn how to give reasons & place a class.

Trail & Ranch Skills: Maneuver your horse through obstacles both on the ground and in the saddle.

Mind, Body, Horse: Learn yoga techniques to relax & settle nerves before riding in shows & events.

Showmanship: This is an educational class to prepare campers for halter classes at the fair.

Equine Vet Demo: Instruction will be given horse first aid & how to make a horse first aid kit.

Horse Treats: Learn to make your own horse treats in this hands-on class

Evening Events/Activities: Includes games, demonstrations, and weather permitting a trail ride.

_____ **Digestion Discovery:** Create a life-size replica of the equine digestive system in this horse science lesson.

_____ **Trouble Shooting with our Clinicians:** Do you have a difficult or young horse you need a little extra help with? ... Then this is the elective for you!

_____ **Bareback:** Instruction on proper technique and seat position for bareback equitation classes.

_____ **Show Clipping & Fitting:** Practice clipping and fitting YOUR horse for the show. Learn the “tricks of the trade” including mane and tail braiding techniques.

_____ **Braided Lead Rope:** Create a custom 6 plait round braided lead rope for your horse!

_____ **Trail:** Focused & individualized instruction for those interested in trail classes & obstacles.

_____ **Horse Driving Demo:** Includes everything about driving you have always been curious about and will include hands-on experience driving.

_____ **English Equitation:** Try out English Equitation for the first time or brush up on your skills.

_____ **Beginning Roping:** Learn the basics of roping; including dummy roping.

WHAT TO BRING

Things You Need:

- Sleeping bag & pillow
- Air mattress/Cots (optional)
- Towel and necessities for showers
- Riding clothes and Hard-soled boots (no tennis shoes for riding)
- Casual clothes if desired
- Toiletries
- Riding Helmet (unless waiver is signed)
- Horse manual (Level Assessments available upon request & manuals are required for assessment)

Things Your Horse Needs:

- Feed (hay & grain)
- Stalls will be available
- Hay net & water bucket
- Grooming tools
- Stall cleaning items (wheel-barrows available)
- Saddle & Tack (Show items not necessary)

A Few More Things to Know:

****HORSES NEED TO HAVE 4-WAY VACCINATIONS BY MAY 15TH TO PROVIDE ADEQUATE PROTECTION AGAINST INFECTION. OTHER IMMUNIZATIONS ARE AT THE DISCRETION OF THE HORSE OWNER.****

****Horseless members are welcome to participate only in horseless activities.**

****Advanced members may wish to bring yearling colts to the camp for the experience. It is recommended that they also bring a riding horse. Stallions allowed only as yearlings.**

****Horse Camp will be limited to 50 registrations with first priority given to youth in Carbon County. Other registrations will be on a first received basis.**
