Five PLT GreenSchools Investigations provide a blueprint for student Green Teams to examine their school's energy use, waste and recycling, water consumption, school site, and environmental quality (such as indoor air quality, school transportation, and use of chemicals) and establish benchmarks. Using the results of their investigations, students select, design, and implement one or more action projects, and measure their impacts. PLT's GreenWorks! grants can providing funding for your school improvement projects.

There are several opportunities for PLT training through workshops offered in several locations throughout the state.



GREENSCHOOLS FOR EARLY CHILDHOOD

New this year PLT's GreenSchools for Early Childhood is a excellent set of investigations designed to teach about the environment and how children can make a difference in their own community. With an educator guide and five investigations that include energy, environment quality, school site, waste & recycling, and water.

The investigations include background information with a checklist of supplies needed, engagement activities to complete investigations, worksheets, action project ideas and plan, and a green your home handout to engage students in continue learning at home with their families.

Online training is offered for the GreenSchools program as well as the preK-8 and Early Childhood guides. The online training is designed for educators who are comfortable with self-directed learning at their own pace. The course is composed of 20-30 minutes of learning experiences, called counsels. GREENWORKS GRANTS

Project Learning Tree offers GreenWorks grants up to \$1,000 to schools and youth organizations for environmental servicelearning projects that link classroom learning to the real world. Students implement an action project they help design to green their school or to improve an aspect of their neighborhood's environment.

To be eligible, applicants must have attended a PLT workshop, either in-person or online, that provides training, lesson plans, and other resources to help integrate these projects and environmental education into your curriculum or youth programs.

The annual deadline to apply is September 30. Funding will be distributed in December.

Grant Requirements

Applicants must have attended a Project Learning Tree training either online or in person.

*Only PLT's <u>PreK-8</u> and <u>Early Childhood</u> online courses meet the online training eligibility requirements.

How to Apply

The deadline to apply for a grant in 2016 has passed. Check back in Spring 2017 to download an application form.

Submit your completed application and W-9 online.

PROJECT LEARNING TREE TURNS 40!

This year, Project Learning Tree is celebrating its 40th anniversary! Back in 1976, the United States celebrated its Bicentennial and the first Earth Day had taken place a few years earlier. Many of the environmental laws and educational reforms now part of everyday life were new on the books or barely imagined. And who knew you would be reading this on a computer screen, let alone on a small handheld device?

Back in 1976, natural resource managers and educators from the then-American Forest Institute (now Foundation) and then-Western Regional Environmental Education Council (now Council for Environmental Education) developed and launched the first PLT workshops in ten states. Forty years later, educators in every U.S. state and many countries around the world are using PLT elementary and secondary materials with their students. Over 40 years, PLT has trained more than 675,000 educators through in-person workshops.

EXPERIENCING THE GREAT OUTDOORS

There is a growing concern of how many children are consistently inside on any given day. Not to mention the high rate of obesity. The Kaiser Family Foundation reported that children ranging from 8 to 18 years of age devote on average 7 hours and 38 minutes using some type of entrainment media on a typical day, more than 53 hours a week. When only about 6% of children 9 to 13 years of age play outside on their own. (Children & Nature

Network, 2008) No wonder there is a concern for our children's health and well being.

Studies show that outdoor time helps build strong muscles, increase large and fine motor skills, enhances imaginations, increases attention span, and decrease aggression. The CDC recommends children and adolescents should do 60 minutes of physical activity each day, that include aerobic activity, muscle strengthening, or bone strengthening. Only one hour a day of physical activity and if a child averages 7.38 hours on a entertainment media a day. Certainly they can fit in one hour of physical activity or can they? How can we as educators help decrease this 7.38 hour gap? Well, the number one complaint I hear from children and even parents is access and interest. Some families would love to take their children on a hike or to the river, but don't have access or the interest simply isn't there.

Children and nature go together, their development are closely tired to their exposure to nature. In some communities children lack the freedom or exposure to nature even in a urban setting. So for those children, how can they play, experience, and care about nature? Well, without the opportunity they simply can't. It is up to us as educator to seek out and create ways for children to get outside and experience the vast great outdoors. If we can create access or interest in the classroom or at home today's children will have a better chance to experience something great.
